Plan ahead for move-in days. Due to continuous work by facilities and residential life staff right up until the move-in days, students will not be permitted to move anything into rooms before their particular designated move-in day.

We have now focused our sights on the August orientation and the start of school; preparations are under way (another herculean task). We were short-staffed this summer with the departure of Bethany Sheffield to the president's office. In making ready for the June orientations without Bethany I said it was like planning for a wedding without a wedding planner! She was a great help to us, even though she was working a new job, and we pulled it off. Campus-wide reading for 2014

It's Complicated: The Social Lives of Networked Teens By danah boyd

We are pleased that our summer reading—It's Complicated by danah boyd—selection will be complemented by the appearance of the author early in the fall semester. As part of the Juniata Presents artist series, author danah boyd (principal researcher at Microsoft, research assistant professor at New York University, and a fellow at Harvard's Berkman




Center), a native of Lancaster, Pennsylvania, will be coming to campus on **Tuesday, September 9**, as our Calvert N. Ellis Memorial Lecturer.

Walter Isaacson, CEO of the Aspen Institute and author of *Steve Jobs*, describes boyd's work thus: "In explaining the networked realm of teens, boyd has the insights of a sociologist, the eye of a reporter, and the savvy of a technologist. For parents puzzled about what their kids are doing online, this is an indispensable book."

It is a rare opportunity for the campus community to have the author of such an important and timely book come to campus, and there is much anticipation about her presentation on the evening of September 9. Families who live in easy driving distance are absolutely invited to attend.

As for boyd's thesis, she hopes that readers will appreciate that the world we live in, and the world our students have come to age in, is dominated by an online media and online society that are evolving with lightning speed. But what about our teenagers? Has technology changed their learning and personal experiences, as many suspect? In her preface, boyd says her book is "... my attempt to describe and explain the networked lives of teens to the people who worry about them—parents, teachers, policy makers, journalists, sometimes even other teens. It is the product of an eight-year effort to explore various aspects of teens' engagement with social media and other networked technologies." Between 2005 and 2012, Boyd traveled across the country, observing teens from a variety of socioeconomic and ethnic communities in eighteen different states, interviewing 166 of them. She combines her skills in communication, analysis, and creativity with a fearless advocacy for technology. The result is a work of non-fiction that speaks to any person with a stake in the success of young people.



You've Got Mail!

Just a friendly reminder that we hope students will check their Juniata e-mail accounts over the summer. If there are any questions or quandaries about your schedule, your financial aid, your housing, or other matters, we are likely to try your Juniata e-mail account **first**. So check it early and often, and respond promptly if you have e-mail from any college office or personnel.

Sometimes students forget or misplace the username and/or passwords that were established earlier in the summer. Please let us know if so, and we'll help you recover it/reset it. There is a lot of important information that will come to you *ONLY* by e-mail, so you'll need access to it all summer long.

Please continue to be conscientious about checking your Juniata e-mail throughout the academic year and respond promptly to any e-mail from a College office. When such e-mail is ignored or left unanswered, a situation can become unnecessarily complicated (and stressful). So when you have e-mail, please respond to it in a timely manner.

Professionalism & Etiquette

As you embark on your college career, we just want to remind new students (every student, actually) that we hope you will approach all academic relationships with the professionalism we know you want to project and the kind of etiquette that those relationships deserve. For example, please address your faculty as "Professor So-and-So" until or unless you are instructed to do otherwise. And please address e-mail to your faculty, your advisors, or staff members in any college office with a proper salutation (such as: Ms. Clarkson, Professor DeHaas, Registrar Frederick)—not "Hey," or by diving right into the matter or responding to an e-mail without an opening. This is not Facebook and it's not Twitter. OK? Now is the time to develop and polish the skills that will serve you well in college, in life, and in your career.

Advising + Advisee + Advisors = Advising Success

Juniata has many things that are a source of pride. Our program of academic advising is one particular bright spot. Speak to highachieving students and recent grads with impressive credentials, and you will find hard work and strong advising relationships during their Juniata careers. Thus, two things:

- 1) We strongly encourage new students to invest in academic advising at Juniata, right from the start; spend the time, make the effort to know your advisors, and you will reap benefits you cannot even imagine.
- 2) Please be timely and responsive with your advisors; choose your own second/general advisor (the deadline for that is early in the spring 2015 semester, but you can certainly choose one sooner) and be sure you get the signatures and advisor approvals you need well before deadlines approach. That means paying attention to the academic calendar and getting things done within the reasonable timeframes set out for students.

By the end of your fourth semester, you should be able to identify at least two people who would write you sterling letters of recommendation; if an advisor isn't one of those people, then you know you should be working harder on getting to know your advisor(s).

Campus Technology

Students will need to re-register their computers when returning to campus. When you arrive, plug in to the network, open your browser window, (Internet Explorer, Firefox, Safari, etc.) and follow the instructions. If your operating system and anti-virus package are up-to-date, the process should be fairly brief.

We recommend pre-scanning your computer a week before returning to campus by visiting: https://jccm2.juniata.edu/authentication/remotescan.html. (You will still need to register once on campus.)

To keep your computer up-to-date:

- PCs, search for 'Windows Update'.
- Macs, click on the Apple icon in the upper left and choose "Software Update..."
- Within your anti-virus program, be sure to update virus definitions.

Juniata supports "business-class" versions of Microsoft Windows 8, Windows 7, and Vista operating systems as well as Mac OSX version 10.7 or newer. Bring all system CDs and resources that came with your computer in the event that you might need them to either supplement or restore system files.

Meal Plans

- First-year students will be assigned Plan 1 for fall and may choose Plan 1 or 1A for spring.
- Returning students in residence halls will be assigned Plan 1A, but may chose from Plans 1 – 3.
- Students in campus-owned houses and apartments will be assigned plan 4, but may change to any plan or opt out of the meal plans.
- Non-campus students, commuters, and students residing in College-owned houses may choose any plan or opt not to have a meal plan.
- All declining cash balances (DCBs) associated with meal plans that are not used by the end of the fall semester will rollover to the spring. DCB not used at the end of the spring semester will be forfeited.
- No meal plan changes will be permitted after the drop/ add period.
- Changes made to meal plans by June 25 will show the correct plan on student billing. Changes after this date will need adjustment noted with payment.
- Declining balances (DCBs) allow purchases at all Sodexo facilities including Eagles Landing, Jitters, Simply-To-Go (S-T-G), Brewed Awakenings, Baker Refectory, and Sodexo catering.
- Additional DCB dollars may be added to your account through your student account or at the Bursar's Office at any time during the semester. These DCBs can be refunded or carried over each year.

Public Safety

Juniata's Office of Public Safety provides the following information to help ensure your safety upon returning to campus.

JC Alerts: Students are encouraged to sign up for JC Alerts, Juniata's rapid communication system regarding emergencies and campus closings. Register your phone number and e-mail address to receive text message and e-mail alerts. Vehicle Registration: All students with vehicles should register the vehicle with the Office of Public Safety, regardless of whether you'll be living on or off campus. Unregistered vehicles in campus parking lots may be ticketed. More information about vehicle registration and parking on campus can be found here: **www.juniata.edu/services/security/parking.html**

Community Oriented Policing: The Department of Public

Safety prides itself on being community oriented. Our officers are intentional in establishing relationships with the campus community and welcome each opportunity to build relationships. Public Safety provides a campus escort service, will jump start your car, help you retrieve your keys, and replace your identification card. It is through these common practices that we hope to get to know you better and help you feel safe and secure while on campus.

Violence Free Zone and Sexual Misconduct: Public Safety proudly supports the Violence Free initiative. If you have witnessed or are the victim of an assault or misconduct please call the Public Safety Office at 814-641-3636. Victims or witnesses can receive support in confidence from the officers and staff regardless of intentions of filing a formal complaint. Crosswalk Safety: Students are reminded to be careful while crossing streets within and around campus. Cross streets only at marked crosswalk areas, and **never text message** or read text messages while crossing.

There are myths and realities regarding crosswalk safety. Myth: Pedestrians always have the right of way.

Reality: No, not always. Legally, pedestrians have the right of way within a crosswalk, but pedestrians are expected to exercise "due care" for their own safety, and are not permitted to suddenly obstruct the path of a moving vehicle that is close enough to be a hazard.

Myth: You are safe in a crosswalk.

Reality: Painted lines do not protect you from harm, even if you have the legal right of way. This is particularly important at crosswalks where there is no traffic signal or stop sign.

Myth: If you see the driver, the driver sees you.

Reality: The driver may not see you in time to stop, particularly if you're coming from the right and the driver is looking to the left for oncoming cars. To be safe, proceed only when the car has stopped.

Please note that **your Juniata e-mail address is where all OFFICIAL BUSINESS will be carried out** and it is very important to keep it upto-date and respond accordingly. Delays could be costly!

Check Your Fall 2014 Class Schedule:

Go to the ARCH (the link is on the bottom of the Juniata homepage), sign in to the STUDENTS tab, then STUDENT ACADEMIC PROFILE, then WEBADVISOR and LOOK at: "My class schedule." Check your schedule carefully. What you see is what we have in the system and you must follow it unless you want to make changes.

Please note: We have had to do some rearranging and have endeavored to get people off waitlists. Consider the schedule you find on the Arch on August 27 as your fall schedule for the start of school. Between now and then, more changes may yet be made to your schedule, so check it once in a while and go with the one that appears the day before the semester starts.

Things to Remember

- The Drop/Add form is available online at: http://services.juniata.edu/registrar/forms
- Drop/Add ends September 5, 2014. A late fee of \$50 may be applied for any additions or deletions after this date. You must see the Registrar for any problems or questions after September 5.
- Register for no less than 12 credits and no more than 18 to avoid an over-credit charge.
- Completing only 12 credits a semester means 10 semesters total (5 years) to achieve the 120 credits to graduate. The average student carries a load of 15 credits.
- If you fall below 12 credits by withdrawing in a semester, you
 may be ineligible for some PHEAA grants for lack of progress. You
 MUST earn 24 new credits EACH year. Contact Financial Planning
 regarding any questions about financial aid.
- Corrections after Drop/Add could result in withdrawal fail (WF) if you are not registered for the right section or class.

Our office hours are Monday – Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. We are open during lunch.

First Day of Classes

We will follow the regular class schedule on the first day of classes. The only exception is all classes must finish by 3:30 p.m. due to the Opening Convocation beginning at 4 p.m. This is the same procedure we follow for classes in the spring on the day of the Spring Awards Convocation.

Class Schedule: Dropping, Adding

Just a reminder that the *first seven class days* is a period of drop/add for all students, and will run from Thursday, August 28, to end of-day Friday, September 5. Changes can be made to class schedules during this period without it being reflected on the final transcript.


Drop/add is a paper-and-pencil process, and students need the signature of their advisor(s) on the drop/add form. It is understandable and expected that some students will want, or need, to change their schedules, but we do hope that a thoughtful conversation with advisors will precede any decision to drop or add.

After September 5, a student can (usually) withdraw from a class, with instructor *and* advisor permissions, but it will be reflected on the final transcript as WP (withdrawn passing) or WF (withdrawn failing) and, of course, no credits will be earned.

AND PLEASE REMEMBER: Monday, September 1, Labor Day, is a full and regular class day . . . though it may be a holiday/day off elsewhere.

The Magic Number: 24

We want to be sure that students and families know that when it comes to **credits earned** over an academic year, there is a magic number, and it's 24. The College expects each of its students to show **24 new credits earned** (**different from credits attempted**) over the course of a calendar year (August to August). A varsity



athlete needs to carry a minimum of 12 active credits to participate by NCAA regulations; the College and its office of student financial planning looks for students to make reasonable progress toward the degree by earning a minimum of 24 credits in a calendar year; and a student's class standing depends on his or her earning 24 credits, at least, per year.

Bear in mind, though, that if a student only earns 24 credits a year for each enrolled year, that means he or she will be in college for **five years total**. Juniata requires 120 credits for graduation. So keep the number 24 in mind. It's important.

Residential Life

Move-In Days for 2014

Students who are part of an approved group or organization will be granted permission to return early. The sponsor/advisor of the group and coaches of fall sports will work with the Office of Residential Life to establish approved return dates.

All other students should plan to return to campus on the designated return dates. Exceptions will only be granted for extreme situations.

Start now to plan accordingly. If students show up unexpectedly and without permission, they will NOT be given keys early and will NOT be permitted in residence halls until approved times.

The following are NOT legitimate reasons to return early:

"My roommate is already back."

"My parents cannot take off work."

"I want to return early to get moved in and settled."
