As an intern at Jugetsudo by Maruyama Nori, a Japanese tea company in a small street in Paris, Haruka assists the manager with various activities. Another aspect of his work consists in helping the company with its communications, creating photo and video content for social media, filming in the store, as well as on site with various clients (luxury hotels and restaurants). Oberholz home and social services for migrant children

Anne-Marcelle is working at the Foyer Oberholz, an organization in Strasbourg that houses and works for the protection of unaccompanied children immigrants, where she has taken on the role of educational assistant. She works with a teacher during evenings, visiting the housing to meet the residents and check in on administrative procedures, and during the day works with the pedagogical team to hold drop-in hours. Here, she assists the youth with administrative procedures, medical help, and tutoring.



Her director is incredibly satisfied with her work, describing Anne-Marcelle as both dedicated and dynamic, with a remarkable capacity to adapt. Her own dual culture allows for another level of understanding and connection with the children. For her part, Anne-Marcelle has an excellent rapport with the students and her colleagues alike, and has easily found her place within the organization.

Musée Adolf Michaelis - Archeology Museum

Bridget is conducting her internship with this archeology museum on the campus of the University of Strasbourg, where she is working as exhibit designer. Bridget is participating in the preparations to exhibit a Kleroterion, or ancient lottery machine. The point of the exhibition is to increase public awareness of the machinery of politics and democratic process as well as of the use of drawing lots, in both classical Greek democracy as well as contemporary political life. Bridget has first been working on the scenography of the exhibition overall, to establish the setting for the design of this particular exhibit. She has also been tasked with the museography of exhibiting this object and is working on modeling the exhibit, using 3D design programs. In parallel, Bridget is conducting bibliographic research on ancient Greece using various sources including Aristotle.



Her director finds Bridget to be an ideal intern. He pointed out that through an internship with this museum, Bridget is able to acquire valuable training in museum professions. Bridget is a fully functioning member of the staff, working within the complex milieu of a museum with ease.
