## DOES THE COLLEGE ADMISSIONS SCANDAL HAVE ANY IMPACT ON JUNIATA?

- Yes and no.
  - No it does not have an effect because Juniata does not have celebrities seeking to enroll—JC is backed by people who believe in JC
  - -Yes because the scandal gives a space for the integrity and overall value of Higher Ed, as an institution, to be questioned and there's risk with that.

#### **SENATE**

- Senate is comprised as follow:
  - -Class Officers: traditional leaders on the senate
  - -Committee members: issues-based/orientated
  - -Cohort Based Leadership. An example of a cohort based leadership group on campus is SAUR, (Students Advocating for Universal Respect) who advocate for underrepresented students on campus.
- Senate challenges include leadership turnover And overall student participation
- Senate has been working on revising their constitution. It presently stands at 20 pages and it may go up to a 170 page document once ratified.
- Senate currently has 31 seats
- Each Class chooses their own officers (Officers seats are President, Vice President, Treasurer and Secretary)
- Cohort members are appointed
- Committee membership is voluntary
  - -they get a lot done, recent success was the expansion of student printing on campus
  - -Meal plan resolution with all access plan was largely done by them

### CLASS OF 2023

- 407 students coming to campus. Which does not include the 14 transfer students
  - -Students represent 21 states; 1/3 of the students come from outside Pennsylvania
  - -5% of them are exploratory POE's
  - -35 international students total
  - -1/3 of the students are 1<sup>st</sup> Gen (first in their families to go to college)
  - -Women are in the slight majority



- -19% are students of color, which is the highest number of students of color in the history of Juniata (all domestic student of color).
- -36% will play a varsity sport
- President Troha interjected that they're a strong academic class.

### RETENTION (Data through the spring of this year)

- 94.9% of students who enroll in the fall re-enroll in the spring this year
- 32 did not return for the spring semester for a variety of reasons
- Average 10 year rate is 94.9%
- Fall-to-Fall goal is 90%
- Juniata is doing well compared to other institutions and the state of Pennsylvania
- 4 year Graduation goal is 75% or more per (grad) class and JC is at 73.9% as of our last cohort
- JC's 4 year graduation rates are higher than public institutions and non-flagship schools

#### **RESIDENTIAL LIVING**

- All students are required to live on campus as part of a 4 year residency requirement (4 years since implemented)
- Last summer new dining services were implemented;
   Sodexho after 30 years has been replaced by Parkhurst.
- The transition was challenging
- Meal plan as it stands is all access (meals at any time)
- Goal is to have Meals at a cost students can afford—JC is getting closer each time
- Moving to use the swipe cards in the Huntingdon Community as a future goal (ex. at Sheetz or Standing Stone and other partners)
- Project plan for Res Hall renovation currently being developed.
- As stands, the plan has two tiers
  - -Fancy stuff such as furniture, etc.
  - -Necessary stuff such a new roofing, ventilation, etc
- Res Hall inquires can be directed to Matthew or Tasia White
- It's harder to raise money for Res Hall renovations
- Financially, as JC's current debt decreases, they can start looking into making the cosmetic changes needed to campus Res Halls
