he author, Dr. David Sowell, is a specialist in the social and labor history of nineteenth-century Colombia. He joined the faculty of Juniata College in 1989 after teaching appointments at Fort Hays State University, Allegheny College, and the University of South Carolina. Professor Sowell earned his Ph.D. from the University of Florida under the direction of Dr. David Bushnell. His The Early Colombian Labor Movement: Artisans and Politics in Bogotá, 1832–1919 has been published by Temple University Press.
