E very year, *Juniata Voices* publishes a selection of the speeches, lectures, and presentations given at Juniata College in Huntingdon, Pennsylvania. Fortunately, 2020-21, in spite of being the heart of the pandemic, is no different. The existence of this volume shows, as some of the pieces in it discuss directly, pandemic resilience.
